Hong Kong Aviation History - Kai Tak Airport - Bryan Wong

What is the first picture that pops up in your mind while you see the word "aviation"? You may come up with ideas like Chep Lap Kok airport or the accident of Malaysia airline. However, have you ever heard about Kai Tak Airport?

Kai Tak Airport is the original name of the former Hong Kong International Airport in Kowloon. Kai Tak Airport has been the exclusive international airport of Hong Kong until July 6 1998.

The story of Kai Tak actually started in 1924. The establishment of Kai Tak

belonged to two plutocrats who were Ho Kai and Au Tak. Ho Kai and Au Tak had owned the land before the government acquired it, which explains the name of the airport.

In 1936, the first domestic airline in Hong Kong was established. After operating for a few years, the dark age of Kai Tak airport began. In 1941 during the World War, Hong Kong fell into the hands of the Japanese which implied that the airport was controlled by them. In 1943, the Japanese army extended Kai Tak by building an additional runway which lied across the Clear Water Bay

Road. But the construction destroyed some historic builds in



the Kowloon walled city.

Over 60 years, the airport has served Hongkongers until July 6 1998. Kai Tak was eventually transformed to government offices and recreational facilities.




What to read?



The school year is almost over. Still feel that you don't know much about what is going on in our school? Let us show you the latest achievements our schoolmates have made and more great suggestions for reading!


How to show off my talents?
